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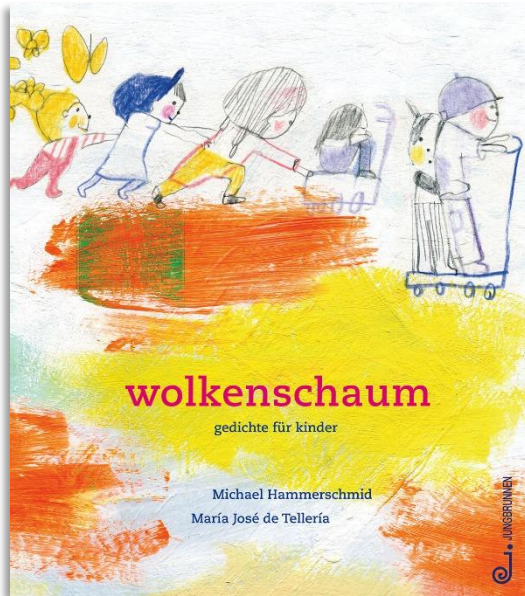

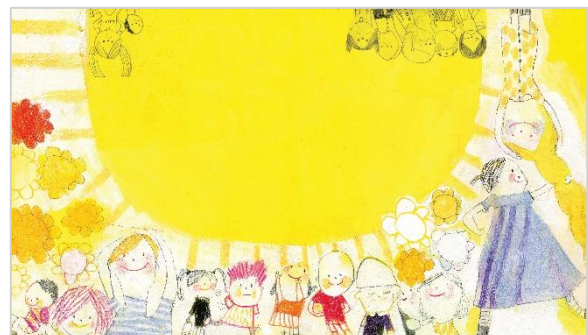


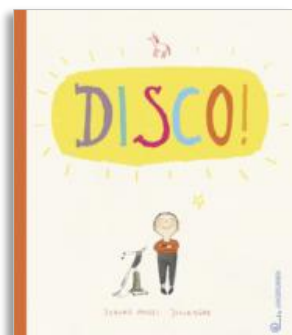

Helga Bansch celebrates the charm of disorder with bright colours and funny details and shows how much children enjoy it when their parents give them the space they need.

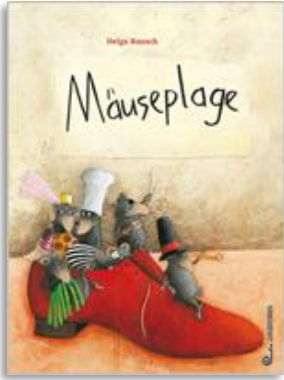


Mini with Aunts and Other Relatives (Mini mit Tanten und anderen Verwandten)

However, when winter comes, they all freeze and when the wolf howls nearby, they recollect the advantages of living together. They move close together again and the PUPU is forgotten. Until in spring an old goat discovers half a PUPU in the meadow. The mutton and the he-goat storm off at the same time to catch it. However, the goat quick-wittedly hurls the PUPU into the canyon.

Michael Hammerschmid presents a particularly fine selection of his poems in this book: Playful with language, associative and with unexpected twists, he opens up worlds that make children marvel and invite them to fabulate.

The Argentinian illustrator María José de Tellería is unknown in the German-speaking world so far. With her complex and poetic illustrations, she succeeds in capturing and intensifying the moods of the poems. Her cheerful pictures tell their own stories and develop a magic that is impossible to resist.

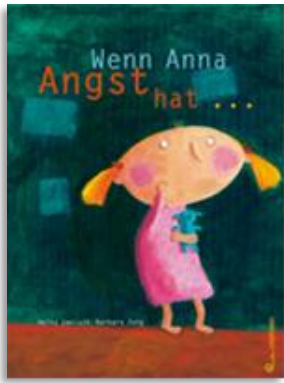

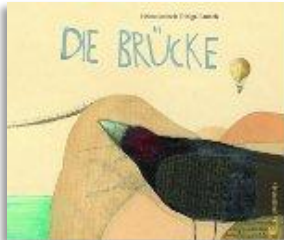

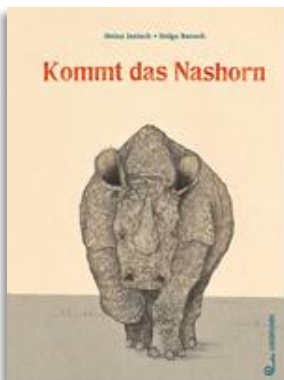

Everyone has his longing for being different and at the same time everyone is just as good as he is.

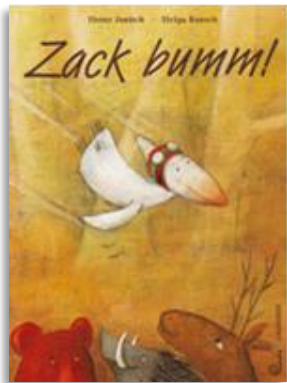


Please, Come In! A Nursery Rhyme (Und du darfst rein)
